December is a very busy, very exciting time for us! From our winter concerts - showcasing the talents of our students, to the students excelling at academics, to our students who are starting their winter sporting seasons - we are still focusing on our students and their instruction.

We are so proud of our 31 students with perfect MCAS scores this evening! That is an amazing accomplishment. As these students approach high school and complete MCAS in grade 10, they become eligible for John and Abigail Adams Scholarships - which provides four years of tuition at colleges and universities affiliated with the University of MA. We have 35 seniors this year who are recipients of Adams Scholarships. Their hard work and dedication has paid off, and we congratulate them on this accomplishment.

Selected students in grade 4 at Balmer school have started an Enrichment Class. Students will be challenged with alternate activities to support their critical thinking skills. This is the type of program that we will be looking to extend into the MS in the future.

Students in grade 5-8 have been invited to enter the Bridge Building Contest sponsored by the Boston Society of Architects. Our teams will meet on Thursday to begin their planning and development.

In your packets, you will find a letter from the MIAA Sportsmanship Committee. Northbridge has been recognized on the 2016 MIAA Sportsmanship Honor Roll. We will be receiving a patch to be added to our banner in the field house. We are proud that our students have been acknowledged with this distinction.

We also want to recognize our students for their community service. Balmer students are collecting non-perishable items and hosted the Fill A Cruiser event at Walmart on Saturday.



BLACKSTONE VALLEY YOUTH LEADERSHIP ACADEMY BEGINS SEVEN MONTH CURRICULUM



High school freshmen and sophomores from several schools began one of the valley's signature leadership programs in early November. BVYLA will educate the young leaders about what it takes to be a successful leader in their schools, communities, and eventually in their chosen careers. The group will meet twice monthly from now through early spring. Each after-school meeting takes place in a different location throughout the valley, exposing the students to much of the area's history and culture. Omni Control Technologies and Access TCA will also host the students in the historic Whitin Mill Complex for a joint presentation about the history of employment in the valley and the leadership that launched the Industrial Revolution. BVYLA is taught by Megan Potenti, a teacher with substantial experience teaching leadership at the Massachusetts State Student Council Summer Camp. Funding for BVYLA and several other programs is provided by a grant through UniBank.





INTERNATIONAL MANUFACTURERS HOST MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS



It was a memorable learning experience for large groups of students who departed their classrooms, boarded buses, and headed out to interact, question, and listen to managers and employees who interact daily with business colleagues in close to 100 countries around the world! International corporations Dell Technologies, Waters Corp, AGS, and Saint-Gobain hosted tours, presentations, interactive sessions, and lunch for groups of students from multiple BVEF member middle schools during October. The goal of the comprehensive visits was to teach students and their teachers about the skills and education required to successfully compete in the international workforce of tomorrow. BVEF partnered with the Blackstone Valley Chamber of Commerce in order to offer this program to the school districts.

BUSINESSES CONNECT WITH HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS ABOUT EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES



Wyman Gordon, Lampin Corp, Package Steel Systems, and Interstate Specialty Products hosted groups of high school seniors who plan to seek employment following graduation. REPRESENTATIVE JOHN FERNANDES MEETS WITH BVEF BOARD



The collaborative efforts target the development of tomorrow's workforce by educating students, teachers, and guidance counselors about the numerous career opportunities within

The board honored Representative Fernandes for his leadership role in helping to launch many of these initiatives and for his ongoing commitment to local school districts.


The National Weather Service Meteorologist began by telling the students why all their cell phones blared out a 'Flash Flood Warning' the night before. The scientist from the U.S. Army Research & Development Center guided the students through an exercise that lead to their own hand-made MRE and explained to them how it needed to survive up to three years with no refrigeration and also had to survive a helicopter drop. Tufts Veterinary interns showed the students how to listen to a dog's heartbeat with a stethoscope. The engineer from Raytheon asked a packed auditorium of students for




volunteers who wanted to come down front and touch a ball giving off 50,000 volts of electricity. About 100 young hands quickly went up in the air to take him up on that offer! The highly-acclaimed conference took place on a Saturday in late October on the beautiful Tufts University campus in Grafton. Students were treated as if they were in college for the day, as they attended interactive workshops throughout the campus. An afternoon early college planning session attracted about 100 parents with information about preparing for college admissions and options to help pay for college. The session was conducted by staff from BVEF and MEFA. Funding for this conference is provided by Southwick Zoo/Earth Ltd., and Homefield Credit Union.

Parents value the importance of good health for their child and children. Parents also value the importance of a good education for their child and children. Academic achievement is important to your child's future, but social and emotional growth are also vitally important to your child's total well-being. Even the most loving parents can be overwhelmed and unprepared to deal with their child's emotional or mental distress.

A Youth Risk Behavior Survey conducted two years ago asked students in Massachusetts schools about their emotional and mental well-being. Nearly one-fourth of those students said they experienced feelings of hopelessness and sadness nearly every day for two weeks or more. National studies tell us that half of lifetime cases of mental illness begin by age 14.

How do you distinguish between a possible illness and "phase"? What are the signs of a mental illness? How do you talk to your child about emotional or mental distress? How can you be a supportive caregiver? And where do you turn for help?

The SHINE Initiative has become a leader in Central Massachusetts in recognizing mental illness in children and young adults as a mainstream health issue. Since 2012 the SHINE Initiative has collaborated with numerous public and private school systems, and colleges and universities, to promote mental wellness through education and information-sharing
